

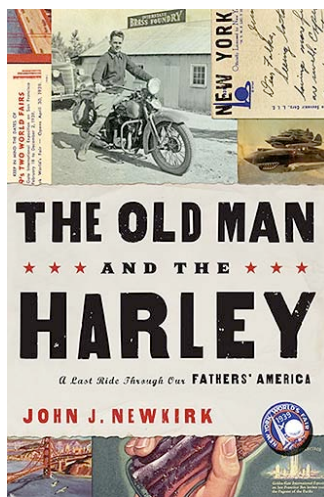

IN THE SUMMER OF 1939—with the world balanced between the Great Depression and the gathering winds of war—young Jack Newkirk set off on a rickety Harley-Davidson to see both the 1939 New York World’s Fair and San Francisco’s glittering Golden Gate International Exposition. He had no way of knowing it was the autumn of his youth—and that his generation would soon be thrust into the most devastating conflict in history.

Seven decades later, author John J. Newkirk retraces this epic ride with his father, Jack, in silent hope the old soldier will still be proud of the America he fought for.
